Painting & Patronage outreach programmes continued in 2011



The scholarship programme for 2011-2012 has been launched in partnership with The Prince's School of Traditional Arts.

Each Painting & Patronage scholarship is a one-year award open to students of Saudi Arabian nationality who wish to join the postgraduate programme at The Prince's School of Traditional Arts in London.

This scholarship scheme is part of the Painting & Patronage 10th Anniversary Programme which was launched in 2010 by HRH Prince Khalid Al-Faisal and HRH The Prince of Wales.

The School's courses combine the teaching of the practical skills of the traditional arts and crafts with an understanding of the philosophy inherent within them.

People come from all over the world to study at the School making a diverse and unique mix of students.



Through the School's programmes:

- vocational skills are passed to a new generation and used to develop sustainable products

Painting & Patronage Schools Programme 2010/2011

As part of the Painting & Patronage outreach programme, primary and secondary schools in London and Burnley participated in the Painting & Patronage schools programme. Workshops took place in each school and through a collaborative and creative process, students were led to recognise the traditional principles of form, pattern and design that derive from nature. The realisation that these principles are exhibited in the arts of each tradition, and shared by all, encourages greater understanding of our heritage.

The programme explored the links between mathematics, science, arts and nature, and introduced the students to a new skillset to enhance their schoolwork. Teachers were supported and equipped with resources, which enables them to continue teaching within the framework of this educational methodology.

As a result of each workshop a collaborative artwork was created and displayed at each school. The permanent exhibition of the works of art created in these workshops is a constant reminder of the unifying results that can be attained by a community whose efforts are directed together towards a common goal.

The schools were selected to participate in the programme based on their multi-cultural student body and how open and receptive the schools are to this education methodology.

In earlier Quarterly Reviews Painting & Patronage announced the activities of three London and Burnley schools participating in the Painting & Patronage Programme - Wilberforce Primary School, Sir John Thursby College and Blessed Trinity Roman Catholic College. In this edition we feature a further five schools.

ELIZABETH GARRET ANDERSON LANGUAGE COLLEGE

Elizabeth Garret Anderson Language College in London is a secondary girls school which has achieved language college status due to the variety of languages spoken at the school. The school is very proud of the communities it represents and of the opportunities it creates for young women to work towards a better future.

The Painting & Patronage Programme focused on working with the art department to deliver two workshops exploring design and the natural world. Forty year-nine students participated in two workshops to explore the language of drawing, watercolour painting and harmonious compositions. In the first workshop participants produced designs for cushion covers and in the second workshop final piece was a painted and stitched tapestry.

MULBERRY SCHOOL FOR GIRLS

The Mulberry School for Girls in London has recently received funding for a new school and community centre on its premises. In this workshop 22 year-nine STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Maths) students worked together to produce a painted and embroidered tapestry for display in the new community centre.

The workshop aimed to show the relationship between Science, Nature and Art, by using geometry as the basis for design. Students were taught geometry and Islimi, two fundamental design methods in Islamic art, then were guided into constructing their own designs for the tapestry. Painting and sewing lessons followed resulting in the finished piece. Pupils had the opportunity to finish their designs at home, with one of the student's mothers helping by applying some traditional Bengali stitching.



The workshop was supported by the Young Foundation, Maslaha project which aims to break down negative stereotypes of Islam by showing the contribution of Muslim scholars to various disciplines.

The Prince's School of Traditional Arts

The 10th Anniversary Programme is a joint initiative between Painting & Patronage and The Prince's School of Traditional Arts (PSTA). PSTA was founded in 2004 by HRH The Prince of Wales from the Visual Islamic and Traditional Arts Programme that was established at The Royal College of Art.



PSTA specialises in teaching, researching, and promoting the practice and theory of the arts and crafts of the world's great traditions and welcomes students from around the world who wish to rediscover the values of the traditional arts and who would like to make a practical contribution to their survival.

The School's courses combine the teaching of the practical skills of the traditional arts and crafts with an understanding of the philosophy inherent within them. People come from all over the world to study at The School making a diverse and unique mix of students.

The programmes aim to encourage an awareness amongst students that form, pattern and colour as manifested in the various branches of the traditional arts, are not simply pleasing to the senses, or demonstrations of good design, but are created to embody beauty — the beauty of the permanent that shines through into the world of the transient.

In the PSTA / Painting & Patronage Programme a schools and community programme benefiting several thousand students is taking place in London and Burnley. In addition, three students from Saudi Arabia will join a Painting & Patronage yearlong postgraduate programme at The Prince's School of Traditional Arts. Plans are currently underway to extend the current Programme to other British and Saudi Arabian cities.

SHUTTLEWORTH COLLEGE

Shuttleworth College in Burnley is the first of the Building Schools for the Future 11-16 colleges to be built in Burnley. It is a completely new building with a staff dedicated to using the facilities to inspire young people to make the most of their time at secondary school. Every aspect of the building design has students' learning as its purpose.

Over the next few years Shuttleworth will develop as a community college firmly embedded in Padiham and Burnley community life. The building will become a focal point for community activity. In that way students will develop a sense of responsibility and pride in where they live and who they are.

HAMELDON COMMUNITY COLLEGE

The Hameldon Community College in Burnley opened in September 2006 as part of the first wave of a nationwide 10-15 year programme of capital investment funded by the Department for Education and Skills called Building Schools for the Future. It initially occupied the adjacent sites of the former Habergham High School and Ivy Bank Business and Enterprise College. It moved to a new £22m building on the site of the former St Hilda's School in September 2010.


